It's a milestone year for the *MusicRow* Awards, which is celebrating its 30th anniversary. We are proud to present Nashville's longest running music industry trade publication honors, and reveal the 2018 nominees for Producer of the Year, Breakthrough Songwriter, Breakthrough Artist-Writer, Song of the Year and Breakthrough Artist.

Winners will be announced during a private ceremony and will be featured in the upcoming print issue of *MusicRow* magazine.

"This year's nominees exemplify Nashville's diverse and growing talent pool, and we are thrilled to highlight them in this special online publication," says *MusicRow* Publisher/Owner Sherod Robertson. "Having three categories dedicated to honoring rising songwriters and/or artists reflects the amount of budding creativity in this city. And helping our subscribed members salute their creative peers is one of the best parts of our jobs."

The *MusicRow* Awards date back to 1988 with the debut of the Musician Awards—Top 10 Album All-Stars. This tradition of toasting Nashville's most indemand session players still continues today. Over the decades, the *MusicRow* Awards evolved with the addition of more categories. Award winners were selected by the magazine's critics until 2008, when they became reader voted.

Subscribed members of *MusicRow* will be emailed a ballot on May 18. Voting closes on May 25. To subscribe, click <u>here</u>.

Final nominees for the *MusicRow* Awards are determined by a committee comprised of critics and tastemakers, with outside nominations being considered for Breakthrough Songwriter and Breakthrough Artist-Writer. Eligible projects were active between May 1, 2017 and April 30, 2018.








PRODUCER OF THE YEAR: ABOUT THE NOMINEES

busbee is a first-time *MusicRow* Awards nominee. His work led to hits by Maren Morris ("I Could Use A Love Song") and Lauren Alaina ("Road Less Traveled"), as well as the 2018 trophy for ACM Vocal Event of the Year for "The Fighter" by Keith Urban featuring Carrie Underwood. busbee is a co-writer and producer of Carly Pearce's *Every Little Thing*, which earned the singer a nod for *MusicRow* Breakthrough Aritst of the Year. busbee is an in-demand producer who also helmed Lady Antebellum's *Heart Break*, and music by Rascal Flatts and Drake White.

Dave Cobb conjured studio magic for Chris Stapleton and Jason Isbell and the 400 Unit, who respectively took home Grammy Awards for Best Country Album and Best Americana Album. Additionally, Stapleton won Album of the Year from both the CMA and ACM for *From A Room: Volume 1*. From Cobb's homebase at Nashville's historic RCA Studio A, he also recorded projects by Zac Brown Band, John Prine, Brent Cobb, Ashley Monroe, Brandi Carlile, Oak Ridge Boys, Randy Rogers Band and Anderson East. Cobb won this award in 2016.

Scott Hendricks, longtime producer for Blake Shelton, continued his studio success with Shelton's latest album *Texoma Shore*, home to the hits "I'll Name The Dogs" and "I Lived It." Adding to Hendricks' recent tally are Dan + Shay's pair of No. 1s "How Not To" and "From the Ground Up,"

Chris Janson's rising single "Drunk Girl" (also nominated for *MusicRow* Song of the Year), and music by Michael Ray and newcomer Tegan Marie.

Dann Huff had a hand in hits by three 2018 MusicRow Awards nominees. He produced Thomas Rhett's groovy Life Changes album, home to "Craving You," "Marry Me," and the title track, which is vying for MusicRow Song of the Year. Huff also steered MusicRow Breakthrough Artist nominees Kane Brown and Midland. He reunited with Tim McGraw and Faith Hill for their duets album and produced recent hits by Brett Young, Billy Currington and Brantley Gilbert. Huff is a two-time MusicRow Producer of the Year, who produced Keith Urban's "Blue Ain't Your Color," the reigning MusicRow Song of the Year and CMA Single of the Year.

Jay Joyce continued scoring hits by his longtime studio collaborators Little Big Town, as well as rising artists Brothers Osborne and The Wild Feathers. Joyce played a major role in helping newcomers Ashley McBryde, LANCO, and Devin Dawson find unique sounds and hone their songwriting abilities, leading to *MusicRow* Awards nominations for LANCO (Breakthrough Artist) and Dawson (Breakthrough Artist-Writer). Later this year, listen for Joyce's upcoming project with Tenille Townes. Joyce won 2017 and 2015 *MusicRow* Producer of the Year.





Kevin Bard soared to his first No. 1 hit with "How Not To," co-written with fellow *MusicRow* Breakthrough Songwriter nominee Adam Hambrick, and established hitmaker Paul DiGiovanni. The track was recorded by Dan + Shay and helmed by Producer of the Year nominee Scott Hendricks.

Casey Brown teamed with Parker Welling and Russell Dickerson to co-write "Yours," which would eventually become Dickerson's first No. 1 as an artist, earning all three songwriters *MusicRow* Awards nominations in 2018.

Andrew DeRoberts scored his first Top 10 hit as a cowriter of "The Weekend," recorded by Brantley Gilbert. The rocking track was produced by *MusicRow* Awards nominee Dann Huff.

Luke Dick boosted his career with his first No. 1, "Round Here Buzz." This song and his previous hit "Kill A Word" were both co-written with Jeff Hyde and Eric Church. The songs were recorded by Church with *MusicRow* Producer of the Year nominee Jay Joyce.

Jacob Durrett and twin brother Devin Dawson have been collaborating for years, and their hard work came to fruition with Dawson's Top 10 hit "All On Me," which they

co-wrote with fellow *MusicRow* Awards nominee Austin Taylor Smith.


Kyle Fishman notched his first No. 1 as co-writer of Dustin Lynch's "Small Town Boy." The Platinum-certified track is Lynch's fifth consecutive No. 1 and spent four weeks at the top of the charts.

Ray Fulcher's fortune went into overdrive when he cowrote "When It Rains It Pours," with fellow *MusicRow* Awards nominees Jordan Walker and Luke Combs. The catchy song about good luck was the first No. 1 for Fulcher and Walker.

Adam Hambrick scored two No. 1 hits during the last year. He is co-writer of Justin Moore's "Somebody Else Will" and Dan + Shay's "How Not To," the latter of which was tracked by *MusicRow* Producer of the Year nominee Scott Hendricks.


Matt McGinn was instrumental in Kane Brown's back-to-back hits. McGinn scored his first No. 1 as co-writer of "What Ifs" (ft. Lauren Alaina). McGinn and fellow Breakthrough Songwriter nominee Lindsay Rimes teamed for Brown's current single "Heaven."



Josh Miller scored his first No. 1 as co-writer of Kip Moore's "More Girls Like You." Miller followed that with the monster chart-topper "Meant To Be," recorded by Bebe Rexha ft. Florida Georgia Line. Miller also has writing credits on the currently climbing hit "Take Back Home Girl," recorded by Chris Lane ft. Tori Kelly.

Sammy Mitchell, Rob Williford, Steven Andre Battey and Luke Combs co-wrote "One Number Away," which became Combs' third consecutive hit. Williford is also nominated for *MusicRow* Breakthrough Songwriter and Combs is up for Breakthrough Artist.

Lindsay Rimes scored his first hit with "Heaven," co-written with fellow *MusicRow* Awards nominee Matt McGinn and veteran hitmaker Shy Carter. The song was recorded by Kane Brown and produced by Dann Huff, who are also 2018 nominees.

Mitch Rossell's "Ask Me How I Know," was his first major cut and first No. 1, recorded by one of the biggest artists of all time—Garth Brooks. Rossell is the only nominee in this category to earn his nomination with a solo-written song.

Emily Shackelton and Carly Pearce brought female perspectives to the ballad of lost love, "Every Little Thing," which they co-wrote with *MusicRow* Producer of the Year nominee busbee. Breakthrough Artist nominee Pearce recorded the No. 1 hit.

Austin Taylor Smith co-wrote "All On Me," alongside Jacob Durrett and Devin Dawson, the latter of which recorded the song and turned it into a cool radio Top 10 hit. All three are 2018 *MusicRow* Awards nominees.

Parker Welling, Casey Brown and Russell Dickerson cowrote "Yours," which became the first No. 1 for all three singer-songwriters, earning them each *MusicRow* Awards nominations. The same trio collaborated for Dickerson's new single "Blue Tacoma."





BREAKTHROUGH ARTIST-WRITER: ABOUT THE NOMINEES

Jordan Davis took his self-penned debut single, "Singles You Up," straight to No. 1 at radio. Davis co-wrote all 12 tracks on his album *Home State* (UMG Nashville), which marks the highest-selling debut release for a solo country artist this year, moving 10,739 units its first week. The Louisiana native recently wrapped his first headlining tour and will hit the road with Jake Owen this summer, stopping at minor league baseball parks across the country.

Devin Dawson blends pop influences but stays grounded in country's storytelling tradition on his debut album *Dark Horse* (Warner Music Nashville). He is a co-writer on every track, including "All On Me," which reached No. 1 on the *MusicRow* chart. The album was produced by Jay Joyce, who is nominated for *MusicRow* Producer of the Year. Dawson is currently on tour with Brett Eldredge as well as playing his own headlining dates.

Russell Dickerson notched his first No. 1 as an artist and as a songwriter when "Yours" reached the top of the radio charts earlier this year. The Triple Tigers Records artist had written the song almost four years earlier with friends and fellow Belmont alumni Parker Welling and Casey Brown, who also earned 2018 *MusicRow* Awards


nominations. The trio re-teamed to write Dickerson's follow-up single, "Blue Tacoma," which is currently climbing the charts. He will support Lady Antebellum and Darius Rucker on their summer tour and play select dates on Thomas Rhett's outing.

Jordan Walker earned his first No. 1 as co-writer of the Luke Combs' smash "When It Rains It Pours," which also yielded nominations for Combs and their collaborator Ray Fulcher. Walker is half of the rising BBR Music Group duo Walker McGuire, along with Johnny McGuire. Walker co-wrote every track on the duo's self-titled debut EP, including new single "Lost."

Morgan Wallen scored back-to-back No. 1s on the *MusicRow* chart in recent weeks. In March, he had his first hit as a co-writer of Jason Aldean's "You Make It Easy." A month later, Wallen returned to the winner's circle with his first No. 1 as a recording artist thanks to the catchy summer song "Up Down" featuring pals Florida Georgia Line. The track is on Wallen's debut album, *If I Know Me*, released via Big Loud Records.



"Cry Pretty"

When Carrie Underwood was ready to release her first new music since 2015, following an injury and a change in record companies, a comeback song was in order. And when a superstar needs a heart-wrenching power ballad, they turn to The Love Junkies. Hillary Lindsey, Lori McKenna and Liz Rose co-wrote "Cry Pretty" with Underwood. She is the perfect vocalist for the soaring chorus and emotional delivery. The Love Junkies previously won *MusicRow* Song of the Year in 2015 for "Girl Crush." Additionally, Lindsey is a reigning Song of the Year co-writer of "Blue Ain't Your Color," and McKenna won for "Humble and Kind" (2016) and "Stealing Kisses" (2007).

"Drunk Girl"

Songwriters Chris Janson, Scooter Carusoe and Tom Douglas offer a sincere message about the *difference between a boy and a man... take a drunk girl home/ let her sleep all alone.* In the wake of last year's #metoo movement, it is a timely subject matter. The lovely pianodriven ballad is full of imagery, delivered by Janson with just the right amount of sensitivity. Douglas is a previous Song of the Year winner for "The House That Built Me" (2010).

"Life Changes"

The charm of "Life Changes" comes from the real-life details offered by Thomas Rhett, referencing everything from his major hit "Die A Happy Man," to adopting a daughter from Uganda, and his wife Lauren's surprise pregnancy. The sunny chorus rings true for everyone: You never know what's gonna happen, you make your plans and you hear God laughing. Thomas Rhett co-wrote the song with father/hitmaker Rhett Akins, Jesse Frasure and Ashley Gorley. It is the title track to his current album.

"Most People Are Good"

Luke Bryan continues his strong track record of offering poignant country songs relatable to the everyman with "Most People Are Good." Songwriters David Frasier, Ed Hill and Josh Kear offer a spot-on lyric about how the world might look some days: If you just go by the nightly news, your faith in all mankind would be the first thing you lose. But the true message of their song proves the opposite: I believe this world ain't half as bad as it looks, I believe most people are good. Bryan and Kear are both previous recipients of MusicRow's Breakthrough Songwriter of the Year award.

"She Ain't In It"


If you want a stone-cold country song about a broken heart, look no further than traditionalist hitmakers Wynn Varble and Clint Daniels. Their song, "She Ain't In It," fits singer Jon Pardi as perfectly as his Wranglers and belt buckle. Playing the role of a lonesome cowboy, Pardi sings, My life won't be the same, as long as she ain't in it. Fiddle and steel accent his twangy delivery, to create one of the countriest songs on the radio today.





Kane Brown

Kane Brown's skyrocketing year earned a Guinness World Record, as the first artist to simultaneously top five *Billboard* Country charts, thanks to his self-titled album, and the songs "Heaven" and "What Ifs." The Georgia native scored his first major radio success with the double-Platinum No. 1 "What Ifs" featuring childhood friend turned hitmaker Lauren Alaina. That song, as well as Brown's follow-up, "Heaven," were tracked by *MusicRow* Producer of the Year nominee Dann Huff. Next up, listen for Brown as the guest on a new genre-crossing version of Camila Cabello's "Never Be The Same."

Luke Combs

Luke Combs is a major force among country's rising stars. The self-made songwriter and road warrior built a fan base by touring and releasing music independently prior to signing a record deal. His 2017 major label debut *This One's For You* earned Gold certification and yielded the two-times Platinum single "Hurricane." The breakout song topped the *Billboard* Country Airplay chart and Mediabase chart for two consecutive weeks. This makes Combs the first debut country artist to hold a multi-week No. 1 since Florida Georgia Line with "Cruise." Combs followed "Hurricane" with "When It Rains It Pours" and "One Number Away," earning those co-writers nominations in *MusicRow's* Breakthrough Songwriter category.

LANCO

LANCO has come a long way since their early days practicing in a carpet warehouse. Fast forward five years, 400 shows and one old RV later, and the hard working band is the first country group in a decade to debut at No. 1 on the *Billboard* Country albums charts. The band is made up of Brandon Lancaster and company: Chandler Baldwin, Jared Hampton, Tripp Howell and Eric Steedly. Their success was driven largely by the multi-week chart-topper "Greatest Love Story," one of the 11 tracks Lancaster wrote for the album *Hallelujah Nights*. Helmed by *MusicRow* Producer of the Year nominee Jay Joyce, the album tallied more than 220 million digital streams as of March. LANCO wrapped a sold-out club run in major

markets before touring the UK and joining Dierks Bentley for their first amphitheater trek.

Midland

Midland's remarkable mix of '90s country and Texas twang proved irresistible for music fans. Donning Nudie-style suits, Mark Wystrach, Jess Carson and Cameron Duddy wooed listeners with debut single "Drinkin' Problem," which went to No. 1 and earned Platinum certification. The trio took home the ACM Award for New Vocal Group of the Year, and scored two Grammy nominations. They followed that success with current single "Burn Out" and a Spanish version of "Drinkin' Problem" featuring Jay De La Cueva. Midland didn't spend much time at home in Dripping Springs, Texas over the last year, as they were busy on major tours with Tim McGraw and Faith Hill, Kenny Chesney, Little Big Town and Thomas Rhett.

Carly Pearce

Carly Pearce's "Every Little Thing" went to No. 1 and earned her the highest charting solo female debut single since July 2015. The Gold-certified breakout hit was co-written by Pearce, Emily Shackleton and busbee, who scored nominations for *MusicRow* Breakthrough Songwriter and Producer of the Year, respectively. Pearce's follow-up single "Hide The Wine" is now climbing the charts. During the last year, Pearce spent time on the road with Blake Shelton, and will join Thomas Rhett, Rascal Flatts and Luke Bryan for upcoming dates. Pearce, a longtime hard worker, has been singing since age 8 and honed her skills by performing at Dollywood as a teenager.

The MusicRow Awards are a key predictor of future success for artists and songwriters. There is a strong correlation between MusicRow's Breakthrough Artist and/or Breakthrough Songwriter winners who go on to win Grammys, CMA and ACM Awards including Luke Bryan, Lady Antebellum, Miranda Lambert, Maren Morris, Kacey Musgraves, Taylor Swift, Carrie Underwood and Zac Brown Band.
